# VARIOUS IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

## 1. IMMIGRATION INFORMATION FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS

Applications for Residence Permits Class ‘B’ and ‘C’ should be done online prior to coming into the country, except for Residence Permit Class “A”. ***NB: All copies should be certified. Also note that the cost for study permit for non-East African students is not covered by the University. Please arrange to pay by yourself or through your sponsor upon communication between you and your sponsor.***

### 1.2 SPECIAL PREFERENTIAL TREATMENT FOR EAST AFRICAN COMMUNITY NATIONALS

Students from East African Community Partner States are not required to apply for Residence Permit Class ‘C’. Instead, they are issued with the Exemption Certificate, which is not paid for.

## 2. TANZANIA COMMISSION FOR UNIVERSITIES (TCU)

The Tanzania Commission for Universities (TCU) as a body corporate established under the Universities Act, No. 7 of 2005, is mandated to assess and hence to recognize awards given by higher education institutions outside Tanzania.

Evaluation of Award is the process of verifying that an award attesting to the knowledge, skills, competencies and education obtained in another country is comparable to the standards established for

Tanzanian awards. A foreign award is an award which has been made by an awarding body outside of Tanzania.

### **2.1 Lodging an application and payment of evaluation fee**

- a) A proper and complete application will include the following:
  1. Fill in the online application form located in TCU website <https://www.tcu.go.tz/> or go directly to: <https://faas.tcu.go.tz/login.php>
  2. A complete set of documentation (see section A of the online application form)
  3. Payment or proof of payment of fee.
- b) Certified copies of award are acceptable. The right is reserved, however, to request original documents and /or have the authenticity of documents verified by the relevant authorities in the country of origin.
- c) Certificate in foreign language must be accompanied by certified translations into English. Note that both the document in the original language and the translation are required.
- d) Secondary school certificates must be issued and endorsed/homologated by official examining/certification body in the country of original. Certificates issued by schools will not be accepted when the examination were conducted by external examining body.
- e) For Evaluation of postgraduate awards applicants must issue their undergraduate certificates and transcripts.
- f) TCU creates a database which contains information you have supplied. This record is used solely in dealing with your application and may be extracted for general statistics purposes or in fulfillment of other legal requirements.

### **N.B**

Documents (b-e) must be uploaded within the respective section in the application form.

Proof of payment (receipt of payment) must be shown in the time of collecting the certificate of evaluation.

### **2.2 Issuing of certificate of assessment/evaluation**

Applicants are required to bring to TCU the original certificates which were uploaded in the system and receipt of payment of evaluation fee for verification when issuing evaluation certificate.

### **2.3 Registration into NM-AIST**

Prospective students with a degree award from outside Tanzania shall be registered/enrolled at NMAIST upon submission of certificate of verification from TCU. *It is important to note that, it is the obligation of the student to process for the certificate of verification from TCU prior to reporting time and not the NM-AIST.* The NM-AIST through the International Office may facilitate the process if requested.

## **3.0 STUDY BUDDY PROGRAM**

The Study-Buddy Program was launched by the International Office to provide information to international newcomers/students, and to help them adjust to their new environment. Every international student is matched with a “Buddy”, i.e. a Tanzanian student who is familiar with the university's structures and is willing to give a helping hand during their stay abroad in Tanzania.

Most of the Tanzania students participating in the Study Buddy Program are aware of the problems that might arise, and therefore may be able to offer possible solutions. Your personal "Study Buddy" can

provide you with valuable advice on everyday life in the university. By participating in the Study-Buddy Program, you will not only be able to get a head-start but you will also come into contact with other Tanzanian students more easily. In the past, we have found that the program really helped to foster friendships, mutual understanding, and broadened the cultural horizon of all its participants.

The program's activities also include various events organized by the Nelson Mandela African Institution of Science and Technology Student's Organization (NM-AIST-SO) which is an excellent opportunity to meet people from all over the world.

#### **4.0 GUIDANCE AND COUNSELING FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS**

Students with academic, psychological, social and economic problems receive guidance and counselling through the Dean of students' Office. The Directorate helps students to intensify the capacity of taking rational control over their feelings and actions, to impart them with skills, awareness and knowledge to confront social inadequacies and make their life at NM-AIST campus more comfortable.

NM-AIST recognizes that guidance and counseling is an integral part of the school's existence. It is not limited to the Guidance Office but implies that everyone involved in the school experience of the student has a part in helping him/her develop; hence, the University implements a comprehensive guidance and counseling service to assist students enhance their psychological growth, emotional well-being and learning potentials.

#### **5.0 ORIENTATION AT NM-AIST AND ARUSHA CITY**

International Office together with Academic Affairs Directorate tend to organize an orientation program within the registration week whereby newcomer students are made familiar with the important places within the NM-AIST. Furthermore, students are familiarized with other important places outside NMAIST and in the Arusha City so as to make them comfortable in a foreign country.

## Useful Information

<b>NM-AIST Address</b>	Nelson Mandela African Institution of Science and Technology P.O. Box 447, Arusha, Tanzania.
<b>Arrival</b>	Students are expected to arrive by Wednesday 9.01.2023
<b>Pick up details</b>	Arrangements are being made for your pick up from the airport (Kilimanjaro International Airport) upon arrival (only for those who have shared their itinerary), whereby specific taxis will be picking guest destined to NM-AIST. It will take around 40 minutes to travel from the airport to NM-AIST. However, it takes longer when traffic is heavy.
<b>Accommodation</b>	Accommodation will be provided to all international students. Masters and PhD Students will be accommodated at Hostel A and PhD students at the Researchers' Village (upon availability).
<b>Internet</b>	Internet is available at the Amphitheatre, hostels, researchers' village and in classrooms
<b>Weather</b>	NM-AIST being near the Mount Meru generally keeps temperatures. On average, the warmest month is February, the coolest month is July. The average annual maximum temperature is: 25.0° Celsius (77° Fahrenheit) and the annual minimum temperature is: 13.0° Celsius (55.4° Fahrenheit).
<b>Banking</b>	There are numerous banks in Tanzania. The major ones include  CRDB, NMB, Stanbic Bank, Standard Chartered, Barclays Bank, Exim Bank, Equity Bank. CRDB has branches near NM-AIST (USA River and Tengeru) and 24/7 Automated Teller Machines (ATM) within campus. Opening hours for banks is 8.30 am – 4.00 pm.

<b>Telephone services</b>	Mobile phones are the most common means of telephone communication. There are Four key players: Vodacom, Tigo, Airtel and Halotel. You can

	Easily acquire a sim card to use but you need to register them before using. When calling Tanzania, you should include +255 before the telephone number. The telephone system may also be used for financial transactions such as paying bills, transferring funds among others. In order to register the sim card you should visit NIDA office to get application form and they will guide you what to do and the International Office will assist you well.

<b>Meals</b>	There are varieties of meals available. The Tanzania favourite is “Nyama choma” with “ugali”. Nyama choma is basically roast meat; usually goat/cow meat. Ugali is made from maize flour. Also, rice is one of the commonest foods in Tanzania.

<b>Currency</b>	<p>The Tanzania currency is called Tanzanian Shillings i.e. TSH or Shillings.</p> <p>The coins used are in denominations of 100,200 and 500 shillings.</p> <p>The bank notes used are 1,000, 2,000, 5,000, 10,000 shillings.</p>	
<b>Public transport</b>	Public transport is by minibuses that use various routes. There are also taxis Available. Motorbikes known as <i>boda boda</i> are also commonly used.	
<b>Smoking</b>	Most public are designated non-smoking. Special areas are provided for smoking. Smoking in non-designated places can lead to arrest and prosecution.	
<b>Orientation week</b>	You are expected to participate in the orientation programme so as to get Familiar with NM-AIST and important places in Arusha town.	

<b>Catering services and Meals preferences</b>	<p>There is a cafeteria in the campus. Due to special requirements by some students, you are requested to inform caterers in advance about any special requirements regarding meals. This include whether you are vegetarians/vegan or would be or NOT comfortable with game meat, prefer Halal etc.</p>
